

Stieglitz and the Photo-Secession, 1902



At the turn of the last century, there was a sense of dissatisfaction within both the American and European photographic communities. In 1902, an avant-garde band of photographers, led by Alfred Stieglitz, began to champion their work as art, rather than as a mere form of documentation, in an exhibit at the National Arts Club in New York. They called themselves the Photo-Secession and are considered to be the best and most original photographers of their day. This group included luminaries such as Edward Steichen, F. Holland Day, Frank Eugene, Gertrude Kasebier, Clarence H. White, and Stieglitz himself. *Stieglitz and the Photo-Secession, 1902* is the first book to re-create that monumental exhibit, with 100 color plates complemented by text from noted art scholar William Innes Homer.
